Greetings to all!

We, the United Methodist Women (UMW), support programs in the United States and around the world that benefit women, children and youth - thereby impacting entire communities. The UMW is an agency of The United Methodist Church, which must abide by the Social Principles and Discipline as determined by General Conference, giving only to projects in accordance with those guidelines.

UMW's Mission Giving: Pledge to Missions, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering, are undesignated funds and support the total program of the organization. Each conference UMW keeps a portion of the Pledge to Mission for its own district and conference Administration and Membership Development (A&MD) expenses. A&MD can include such items as scholarships to Mission u and other events, assistance with child care expenses, postage and supplies, officer and committee expenses – amounts that enable districts and conferences to be in mission right where they are. A&MD line items are voted each year at conference and district Annual Meetings. The remainder of the Pledge to Mission and ALL income from the other four channels of Mission Giving are forwarded to the National Office, where Mission Giving becomes the largest portion of the annual undesignated income of the national organization.



Reading Program



Mission Education and Interpretation:

This has been a fast year! I have been honored to serve as your MEI Mission Coordinator this past year and am looking forward to serving as your Vice-President in 2022. I probably sound like a broken record, but I want to remind all units again of our Hands on Mission projects: we are still collecting school supplies (#2 pencils, colored pencils, washable markers, jumbo pencils, jumbo crayons, construction paper, glue sticks, craft sticks, gift cards or checks) for the Bethlehem Center, Winston Salem (I plan to deliver these supplies in late September/early October) and school supplies for the students served by Project AGAPE (supplies needed are #2 pencils, colored pencils, hand-held pencil sharpeners, erasers, and school scissors. All items should be removed from packaging and packed in plastic shoeboxes.) Additional Project Agape items being collected for Hand on Mission at our Conference UMW Annual Celebration include new children's clothing sizes 2 to 14, all items, especially clothing for boys; children's shoes in all sizes; and blankets. I know many units have not been able to meet throughout this pandemic, but mission needs have not taken a break. If individuals or units can help with these needs and have collected any hands on mission items, please contact Sherry Summerlin or me.

The theme for the September/October 2021 response magazine is "Being Good Neighbors". How are UMW good neighbors? We give financially – in 2020, the grand total of giving for our five jurisdictions was \$10,998,225.80. One area this giving supports is UMW-related national mission institutions, such as the Neighborhood Center in Utica, New York mentioned in this *response* issue. Another article talks about Climate Justice Aid in Nicaragua – how UMW emergency funds offer post-hurricane support for rural Nicaraguan communities. We give of ourselves by putting faith, hope and love into action - we volunteer. We give of ourselves and educate ourselves by nurturing, educating and equipping women to make positive change - we attend Mission u, district mission studies, and this response issue talks about educational opportunities at Assembly 2022 in Orlando, Florida. As our UMW President put it in her message, "Just as the members, leaders, missionaries, and deaconesses who came before us, we are building relationships not just among ourselves but with women and children across all kinds of differences in committing to the work that makes mission possible." We are good neighbors - I encourage you to read response magazine and learn about our 'mission dollars" and mission actions at work. I also hope that many of you attended our WNCC UMW Annual Celebration and heard how we "Light up our Spirits with Faith & Hope so Love is Action."

Social Action

Criminalization Of Communities of Colorization and Mass Incarceration

Over the past several years we have continued to hear the phrase Systematic Racism. What does that phrase mean? The definition is a form of racism that is embedded through laws and regulations within society or an organization. It can lead to such issues as discrimination in criminal justice, employment, housing, health care, political power and education among other issues.

For instance, a prime example is over the course of a man or woman's lifetime the likelihood of serving time in prisons are:

1 in every 9 men (all races) will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 17 White men will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 3 Black men will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 6 Latino men will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 56 women (all races) will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 111 White women will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 18 Black women will serve time incarcerated.

1 in every 45 Latino women will serve time incarcerated.

The United States locks up more people per capita than any other nation in the world.

In the early 80's the United States began a War on Drugs and the people imprisoned skyrocketed. An example of those numbers are as follows:

Place of Incarceration	1980	2013
State Prisons	19,000	210,200
Federal Prisons	4,700	98,200
Local Jails	17,200	180,060

**14% of the imprisoned are drug users. **37% are incarcerated for other drug offenses.

A black man's sentence for drug offenses usually equals a white man's sentence for violent offenses.

The families and minor children are affected in many ways and the repercussions are astronomical.

Mass incarceration is also showing itself in the Juvenile Justice system. In 2015 a chart of about 10 countries showed that the lowest number of youth being incarcerated was 1 per 100,000 youth. The highest on the chart was South Africa with 69 per 100,000 youth. There is one exception which is the United States and we average 336 per 100,000. These numbers astonish me and breaks my heart. We need to make some changes and be proactive instead of being reactive.

The cost per year for a youth to be in publicly funded schools runs anywhere between \$6,000 to \$8,000 in contrast to housing a youth in Juvenile Detention which runs \$66,000 to \$88,000 per year. Which is the best way to invest our money for the sake of our country and mankind?

Mass incarceration is largely an intentional system of racialized control. Mass Incarceration is largely correlated to poverty in the U.S. Mass Incarceration has a dismal affect on family life in black and brown communities. It causes a plethora of collateral consequences which prove to be devastating and annihilating for young people, seriously hampering their life opportunities. Mass Incarceration feeds directly into the "school to prison pipeline." It dehumanizes and demonizes people of color in general, and specifically the formerly incarcerated. Mass Incarceration is becoming more and more unjust as it becomes a significant part of the movement to privatize public services and make prisons a profit driven industry. The owners of privatized prisons are raking in the money. We will be following COVID-19 health safety protocols, as will Holiday Tours. Proof of vaccinations is required to travel on the bus and must be submitted with your Bus Trip Reservation Form by November 10, 2021. If booster vaccination guidelines are announced, proof of booster vaccinations will also be required.

Commitment / Covenant for all Passengers: I covenant and agree to the following with regard to travel to Orlando on the Western North Carolina Conference United Methodist Women Assembly bus trip:

- I am providing a valid copy of my COVID-19 vaccination record.
- I will not travel if I have been in close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 in the 14 days prior to departure. I will not travel if I have had a fever of 100.4 or more in the last 48 hours prior to departure, or if I am experiencing cough, shortness of breath, sore throat, loss of taste or smell in last 14 days, or vomiting or diarrhea in the last 24 hours.
- I will check my temperature within 24 hours of departure and I will not travel unless it is below 100.4 degrees.

Indemnification: I understand that I am travelling at my own risk. I agree to release, indemnify, hold harmless, and covenant not to sue Lynne Gilbert, Sara Williams, or Western North Carolina Conference United Methodist Women and its agents, volunteers, representatives, or any other person involved either directly or indirectly, from all claims, suits, expenses, attorney fees and demands of any nature (including negligence) caused by, deriving from, or associated with my travel. I make these covenants, release and waivers knowingly and voluntarily. It is further understood and agreed that this travel assumption of risk, release and indemnity agreement is to be binding on my heirs and assigns and I am signing of my own free will.

Holiday Tours Protocols for Infectious Diseases: On behalf of all passengers, the Group Leader/Lessee recognizes and acknowledges that there are certain inherit risks associated with infectious diseases, including COVID-19, and accepts full responsibility for personal injury to themselves or others in their party.
