We Can Do This....Because it Matters

On June 10, I sent the Appalachian District 2nd Quarter Remittance to the Conference Treasurer. This marks the halfway point in our 2025 Mission year. Although I try to avoid “guessing” what our Giving results will be for the full year at this point, because so many different things can happen, it is hard not to speculate. In this case, I have violated my past rules. Upon assessing the current status of our Appalachian District members mid-year giving, the outlook for achieving our 2025 Pledge to Mission is very good. Our 2025 Goal, (our Pledge to Mission) is \$30,000. As of the end of the first half of 2025, we have remitted a total of \$13,701 in Mission Giving. That represents the remittances sent from your local units as well as the love offerings from our Mission Study in

February and our Prayer Breakfast in April as well as gift to Mission cards purchased at these gatherings or ordered and purchased by some local units by mail. \$13,701 represents 46% of our Pledge at this halfway point in our Mission Year, an amazing and gratifying milestone.

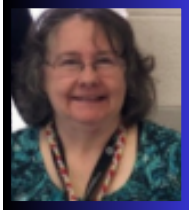
Congratulations! But, as we celebrate, let's remember and celebrate Why it Matters. It Matters because United Women in Faith Mission Giving:

- Supports Psumai Ulagam (Green World) in India, who provide instruction in the art of tailoring and provides micro loans to women living in rural and urban areas, helping them start their own businesses. (response January/February 2025 pp 28-35)
- Supports Deaconesses in Manila demanding justice for those killed at the hand of the 2016 – 2022 Duterte regime. (response March/April 2025 pp34-43)
- Supports a “Housing First” affordable housing initiative designed to provide Nome, Alaska’s homeless and vulnerable community with a path toward permanent housing. (response November/December 2024 p 43)
- Supports Murphey-Harpst that provides a safe and nurturing environment in North Georgia where abused and neglected children can thrive and heal. (response November/December 2024 p 43)
- Supports IDP Women Association “Consent’ work with Internally Displaced Persons and support Ukrainian refugees in Georgia. Tbilisi, Republic of Georgia (response March/April 2024 p32)

As you all know, that list just scratches the surface of Why it Matters. And you, faithful members of Appalachian District United Women in Faith are all part of making it ALL happen. Through your Mission Giving you are living our Purpose.

I hope you are enjoying spring. Have you selected your summer reading books yet? Did you know that there is a mystery book on this year's reading list? I was surprised as well, because I love mysteries, but would not expect to find one on the United Women in Faith Reading list. It's called *All That is Secret* (An Annalee Spain Mystery) by Patricia Raybon. The book takes place in Denver Colorado; since I'm originally from Colorado I had to check this one out.

The book is highly acclaimed as a 2022 Christy Award Winner! This award celebrates excellence in Christian Fiction. It is also listed as PBS Masterpiece's "Best Mystery Books of 2021: As Recommended by Bestselling Authors", and BookBub's "16 Best Historical Mysteries of 2021".



Can an amateur detective solve the cold case mystery of her lost father's murder? In the winter of 1923, Professor Annalee Spain—a daring but overworked theologian at a small Chicago Bible college—receives a cryptic telegram brought to her by a dead preacher's boy and from the poor looks of the child, a Methodist preacher, at that. The telegram calls her home to Denver to solve the mystery of the murder of her beloved but estranged father. For a young Black woman, searching for answers in a city ruled by the KKK could mean real danger. Still, with her literary hero, Sherlock Holmes, as inspiration (each chapter starts with a quote from a Sherlock Holmes book) Annalee launches her hunt for clues, attracting two surprising allies: Eddie, a relentless young white boy searching for his missing father, and Jack, a handsome Black pastor who loves nightclub dancing and rides in his sporty car, awakening Annalee's heart to the surprising highs and lows of romantic love. With their help, Annalee follows clues that land her among Denver's powerful elite. But when their sleuthing unravels sinister motives and deep secrets, how will Annalee confront the dangerous truths and beliefs that could make her a victim, too?

This is a great summer read, I hope you will check it out. Don't forget to go select books your group has finished reading to bring to the Book Exchange at District Annual Celebration in August. I look forward to seeing you there.

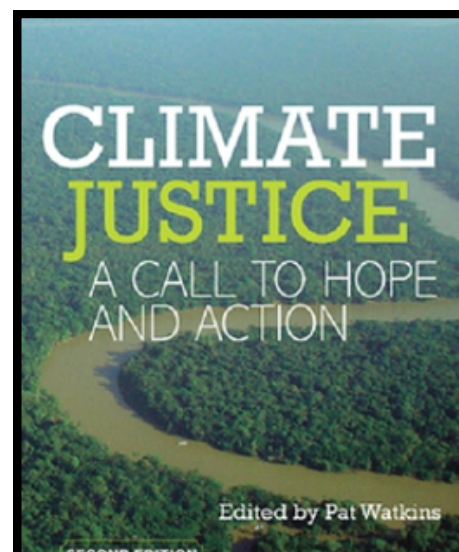
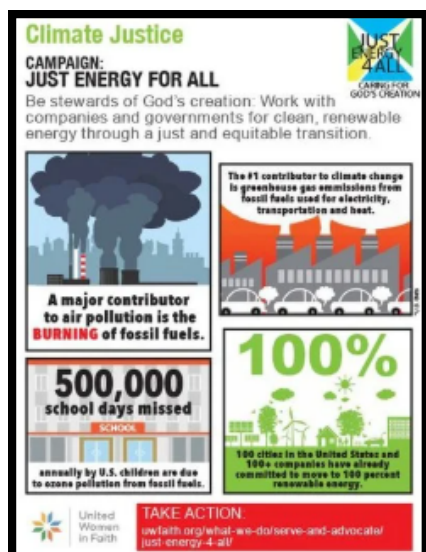

Key Principles

- Participation: Involving affected communities in climate decisions.
- Accountability: Holding stakeholders accountable for their climate impact.
- Intergenerational Justice: Ensuring a livable planet for future generations.

Climate justice is crucial in the fight against climate change, emphasizing equitable solutions for vulnerable communities. Advocate for policy changes, engage with communities, raise awareness, adopt sustainable lifestyles, support affected communities, and hold corporations accountable to achieve a just and sustainable future.

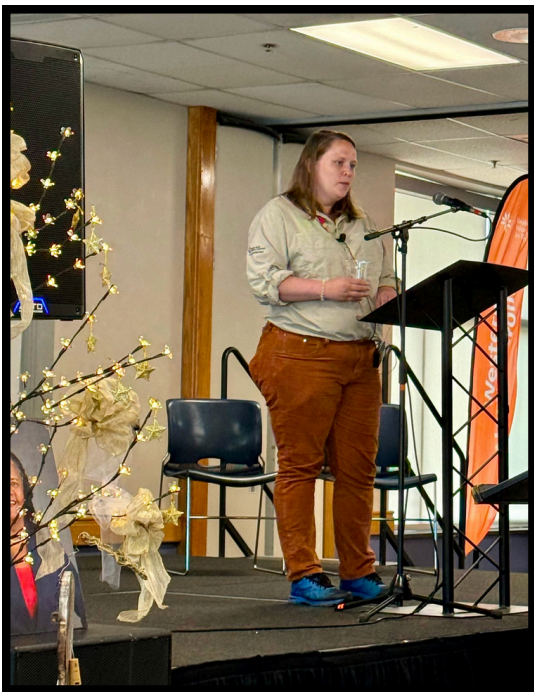

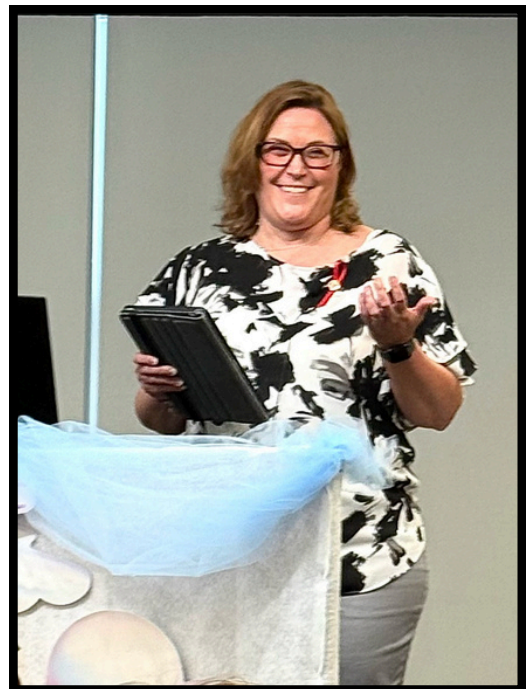
Pictures from 2025 Spiritual Growth Retreat

Mission, Education, and Interpretation

Greetings everyone!! In the July/August issue of *response* magazine, we meet Secretary Melba McCallum, who retired as vice president of the North Carolina Community College System in 2005. She had a powerful spiritual awakening and a life's mission to serve God by serving others. Her journey within United Women in Faith began through simple acts of presence and participation, eventually leading to positions of leadership. Melba served as president of her local unit, moved into district leadership, and later into conference-level service. At Assembly, she encountered a deaconess pamphlet that seemed to follow her everywhere she went, which to her was an indication that God was calling her into something deeper.

In 2007, she founded Partners In Ministry, a nonprofit born in her living room. Today, it is the only United Women in Faith National Mission Institution (NMI) in North Carolina. It has empowered 4,679 young adults through Youth Empowered to Succeed (YES), over 353 mission teams for urgent home repairs, and over 3,500 families with vital food support. The organization is also on the frontlines dismantling the school-to-prison pipeline, improving family stability, and creating real opportunities for change.

Melba's story is not just inspiring, but an invitation to all to answer God's call. She shows us that ministry begins with availability, service flows from passion, and that you don't need a title to lead. UWFaith is a platform for purpose, equipping you to serve boldly, lead faithfully, and grow spiritually.

The purpose of becoming a Mission Today Unit is to:

- Energize United Women in Faith to be more involved in mission through prayer, study, and action.
- Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so members understand where their money goes.
- Encourage the use of mission resources through UWFaith. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a unit? A unit is any organized group of UWFaith within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles or members from different churches which periodically meet as a unit.

How does a unit become a Mission Today unit?

To be recognized as a Mission Today unit (Gold, Silver, or Bronze), a unit must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated in the chart below. Activities conducted between January 1 and December 31 of the reporting year will be recognized at Annual Celebration the following year.

Gold	Silver	Bronze
Complete 10 criteria: 6 with asterisks* and 4 other**	Complete 8 criteria: 4 with asterisks* and 4 other** **Other may include items with asterisks	Complete 6 criteria: 4 with asterisks* and 2 other**

Criteria:

- *1. Make and meet the unit Pledge to Mission. Send Pledge amount and funds to the District Treasurer.
- *2. Use the Daily Prayer Guide at each unit, general, or circle meeting to pray for mission personnel and mission projects. The Guide is updated annually and may be ordered from [UWFaith Resources](#). Daily Prayer Guide entries are posted on the [UWFaith Facebook Page](#).
- *3. Use at least two programs from the Program Resource book during the year. A new [Program Resource](#) is printed every year and may be ordered from [UWFaith Resources](#).
- *4. Conduct or participate in at least one mission study (virtual or in person). Contact your District or Conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn more about the studies. If members of your unit attend all sessions of Mission u or a District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study (Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc.), your unit will meet this criterion.
- *5. At least two members will subscribe to **response** magazine (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members; local unit subscription may count as one). Order information is provided at the bottom of p. 2. A one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription) is \$24; a one-year digital-only subscription is \$20. More information may be found at <https://uwfaith.org/resources/response-magazine/>.
- *6. Implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. **If you are a “Justice Today” unit, you have met this criterion.** Possibilities include:
 - Read and discuss books and articles about other ethnicities and cultures.
 - Sponsor or attend an interethnic or intercultural event between two or more units.
 - Intentionally recruit women of various ethnic or cultural groups to be unit members and officers.
 - Use the Racial Justice resources available on our Conference website on the “Downloads Available” page under “Mission Resources” or at this link: <https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/>
- *7. Have a program or take action addressing a United Women in Faith justice campaign (current campaigns are [Just Energy 4 All](#) and [Ending Mass Incarceration and Criminalization of Communities of Color](#)). More information may be found at <https://uwfaith.org/what-we-do/serve-and-advocate/racial-justice/>
- *8. Add at least two new members (1 member for units with fewer than 15 members).
- *9. Have a program from the [Social Principles of The United Methodist Church 2025-2028](#). This resource may be purchased at www.Cokesbury.com for \$9.99 plus tax and shipping; available in paperback or eBook.
- *10. Contribute to all Five Channels of Giving (Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering).

- *11. Recite the UWFaith Purpose at each general and/or circle meeting, including virtual meetings.
- *12. Contribute \$189.60 or more to the [Legacy Fund](#) during the reporting year.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on the experience. Virtual participation qualifies.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend the District or Conference Annual Celebration and report back to the unit about the experience; virtual participation qualifies.
- 15. At least one person will join the United Women in Faith e-mailing list to receive and respond to advocacy information at least three (3) times a year. Attach the issue and action that was taken to Mission Today report.
- 16. Members will correspond with five people listed in the Daily Prayer Guide at least once a year.
- 17. Co-sponsor, with the local church, a “Children’s Sabbath”. This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children. Materials are available at <https://uwfaith.org/event/childrens-sabbaths>
- 18. Include a “**response** moment” at each unit or circle meeting where an item from **response** magazine is shared as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. Sponsor a teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or a young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one Conference event during the year.
- 20. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will attend a District Prayer Breakfast/Day Apart, Conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special District or Conference event (other than Ubuntu Day of Service). Virtual participation in any of these events qualifies.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will participate in and [Ubuntu Day](#) event. Units may develop their own Ubuntu event in their communities.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with fewer than 15 members) will complete Plan I of the United Women in Faith [Reading Program](#) and report to the unit on one of the books read. Find information here: <https://uwfaith.org/resources/reading-program/>
- 23. Invite a District or Conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings (may be virtual) and/or for a United Women in Faith Sunday. This qualifies as a local unit visit in the Nurturing Partners program.
- 24. Add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18-39) member or circle during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit’s active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund.
- 26. Meet the 2025 Conference Financial Goal: To increase our “Gift in Memory” giving by 10% over 2024 giving.
- 27. Support at least one local mission project and participate in at least one Conference hands-on mission project during the year. List the local mission project on the Mission Today report.

Directions to First North Wilkesboro UMC:

From Sparta and North: Follow Hwy 18 South to N. Wilkesboro; turn right on 6th Street; cross over D Street (traffic light) and the church is on your left. **From Statesville and South:** Take HWY 115 North, turn left onto 2nd St in North Wilkesboro;

turn right onto 6th St.; cross over D Street (2nd traffic light), and the church is on your left.

From Hickory, Hudson, Granite Falls areas: Take US Highway 64-90E to NC 90 E.; Turn left onto NC 16; in approx. 17 miles, turn right onto W Main St. in Wilkesboro; in 1 mile, turn left on Wilkesboro Ave; and in .8 miles, turn left on Sixth Street. In .2 miles, cross over D Street (2nd traffic light) and the church is on your left.

From Taylorsville/Stony Point/Hiddenite: Take NC 16 toward Wilkesboro; in approximately 17 miles, turn right onto W Main St. in Wilkesboro; in 1 mile, turn left on Wilkesboro Ave; and in .8 miles, turn left on 6th Street. In .2 miles, cross over D Street (2nd traffic light) and the church is on your left.

From Boone & areas west: Take US-421 South; in 31 miles, use the left 2 lanes to turn left onto Business US-421; continue straight about 2.1 miles onto D Street; In .5 miles turn left into the church parking lot.

From Elkin, Ronda, Roaring River and West: Take NC 268 West to North Wilkesboro; turn left onto 2nd Street; turn right on 6th Street; cross over D Street (traffic light) and the church is on your left.

From Yadkinville: Take US-421N to exit 282 (NC-115N); Keep right onto NC-115; in approx. 3 miles, turn left onto 2nd Street (US-421 BUS N) and in .5 miles, turn right onto 6th Street; cross over D Street (traffic light) and the church is on your left.
