President

Well, I believe summer has officially arrived (at least my thermometer sure thinks so!) As I mentioned last quarter, I attended Assembly 2026 in Indianapolis, Indiana, May 14-17. I traveled with Linda Greer, Martha Phillips, and Nancy Litton, so some great fellowship started before the Assembly started! On the 14th, I attended the Soul Care Retreat where we focused on the Assembly theme **“Dream it! Believe it! Do it!”** **“Dream it!”** focused on John 16:13, which was explained as Jesus saying, “I owe you truth; the Holy Spirit will help you digest it!” We enjoyed music, storytelling, and essential oils. **“Believe it!”** focused on not losing our joy - how joy is a spiritual discipline and Rev. Lizzie McManus-Dail (Father Lizzie) made several references to her book, *God Didn’t Make Us to Hate Us* - 40 devotions to liberate your faith from fear and reconnect with joy. **“Do it!”** referenced Corinthians and Philippians, quoting that “All things are possible with and through God.” Two quotes from Rev. Gail Song Bantum, I liked were: “We can only believe what we can imagine and only do what we believe,” and “A bird doesn’t sing because it has an answer; a bird sings because it has a song.” She emphasized that we should all sing our song. Bishop Tracy Malone (President, Council of Bishops - 2024-2026) shared a benediction. Friday officially started our 21st Assembly (quadrennial gathering of UWFaith). There were approximately 3000 in attendance, 22 Deaconesses and Home Missioners were consecrated, and we celebrated mission (missionaries attended from Sierra Leone, the Philippines, Mozambique, and Peru) – many women and country representatives were not able to attend due to current visa restrictions. The primary message for the weekend was “When women unite to carry out God’s mission, they are ‘UNSTOPPABLE.’” Our Assembly theologian was Rev. Stephanie York Arnold, top executive of the United Methodist Commission on the Status and Role of Women for the Methodist Church. Her sermons focused on Jesus’ promise of ‘abundant life’ – in opening worship, she quoted, “We are meant to be bearers of the light who dream a different way of being, a more abundant life for all, and we are meant to be the workers who build it!” She went on to say, “Can you imagine the light we could shine if we all agreed to shine it in a way that creates abundant life for all people?” Saturday’s focus was on Social Justice Issues – we heard from leadership panels about how their Christian faith inspires them to act and from voting rights champion, author, and political leader Stacey Abrams and her mother, retired pastor Carolyn Abrams. Carolyn Abrams, who holds a Master of Divinity degree from Candler School of Theology, credits United Women in Faith for “whetting her appetite” to serve. When she heard a United Methodist woman talk about social justice, she began attending UMW meetings, even though she was still a Baptist at the time. So, it was service that drew her to join the UMC and, later, to add a divinity

degree to the master's degree she already held in library science. "My Parents were 40 years old when they decided to go to divinity school, and they could not type," Stacey Abrams said. "I became their typist." She and her five siblings also became young social activists, watching and joining with their parents as they championed for justice. "Occasionally people don't like me," Stacey said as the audience laughed. "One of the ways I learned to navigate was watching my mother as a Black woman pastor in the Deep South. I watched men of God tell her she was not allowed in the pulpit." Instead of expressing anger, Carolyn Abrams stayed grounded, her daughter explained. "My mother made sure that people understood the choices that they were making, and she did it with this civility and politeness, but also a courage that said, 'You will not take from me what the Lord has called me to do.' You're not mad at me; you're mad at the justice that I'm trying to fight for. ... But courage isn't belief; courage is action." Stacey Abrams credited her parents for teaching that whatever power they may have, there are some with less and that her job is to serve those people. "What resilience looks like is sitting next to me," she added, talking about her mother's accomplishments, among them raising six children and merging three churches, then building a new one, all while battling racism in southern Mississippi and in the Church. "My mom said you meet people where they are, not where you want them to be, but she also said, once you meet them there, move them to where you want them to be," Stacey Abrams said. At one of our general sessions, Sally Vonner, CEO & General Secretary said: "Today, we are already a powerful movement, about 300,000 women strong in the U.S. alone. But imagine this. If every one of us invited just one woman, just one, we would grow to over 500,000, meeting our goal for 2029! ... We are UNSTOPPABLE!" Civil Rights activist Elizabeth Eckford of the Little Rock Nine and Stacey Abrams spoke at the Legacy Banquet Saturday evening, and WNCC UWFaith received an award for a 3-way tie for Legacy Fund participation. In our closing worship on Sunday, Rev. Stephanie York left us with the thought that we should use our God-given 'saltiness' to do our part. Jesus never asked us to be his admirers; he asked us to be his followers." The Next SEJ Quadrennial Celebration will be in Mobile, Alabama, April 28-30, 2028, and the next UWFaith Assembly will be in Richmond, Virginia, May 17-19, 2030. I encourage all who are able to consider planning to attend one or both of these events – we have 2 and 4 years to save and plan!



June 11-13, I attended our WNCC UWFaith Spiritual Growth retreat. As always, this was a spirit-filled/inspirational 2-1/2 days. Our theme was Winds of Change, and our retreat leader, Rev. Dr. Lucy Robbins, lead pastor of the Biltmore Village Cooperative Parish, delivered three messages focusing on Winds of Change – Disruption – Reflection – Transformation, based on Scripture from Matthew 14.

Our mission speaker was Rev. Holly McKim, who spoke "firsthand" about Hurricane Helene as the pastor of Spruce Pine UMC. We enjoyed wonderful music, led by Deaconess Tracey Owens and pianist Howard Smith, inspiring worship, meaningful breakout sessions, and all-around great fellowship. Our next events are Mission u at the Catholic Retreat Center in Hickory and our Appalachian District Annual Celebration at Union Grove UMC (see our events page in the newsletter for more specifics.) 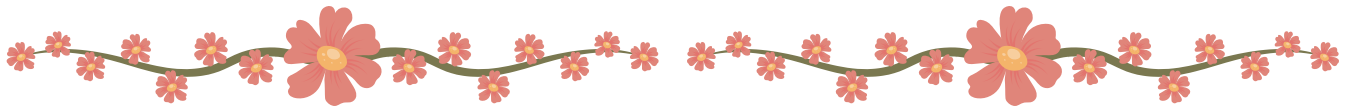
Greetings!

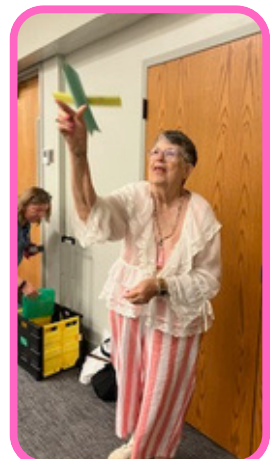
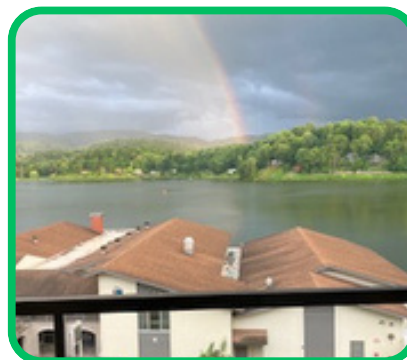
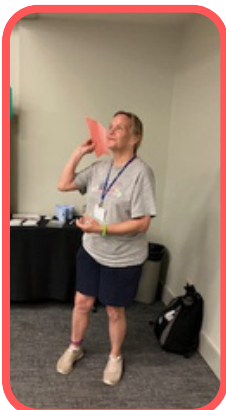

The School-to-Prison Pipeline in North Carolina: Awareness & Action

Understanding the Issue and How You Can Help

Understanding the Issue in North Carolina: Black students are arrested at six times the rate of their white peers within NC schools, despite making up just 24.7% of the student population. Over half of all youth justice referrals in NC originate from schools, mostly for minor, non-violent incidents, and disproportionately affect students of color.

Why It Matters: Exclusionary discipline, like suspensions, expulsions, and school-based arrests, disconnects students from education and guides them toward justice involvement. These responses often fail to address root causes and instead accelerate the path to juvenile and adult criminal referrals.

How to Become More Aware:

- Study Local Data: Investigate suspension, arrest, and referral data for your district.
- Engage with Advocacy Groups: Connect with organizations like Carolina Justice Policy Center and NC Justice Center.
- Participate in Community Discussions: Attend school board and community meetings.
- Listen to Student Voices: Support platforms where students share experiences and lead workshops.

Take Action: How You Can Help:

- Policy & School Reform: Advocate for ending zero-tolerance policies and implementing restorative justice.
- Promote School–Justice Partnerships: Ensure referrals are the last option.
- Support ‘Raise the Age’ Funding: Help close loopholes and fully fund reforms.
- Community Training & Engagement: Organize or attend ‘Know Your Rights’ workshops.
- Amplify Student-Led Advocacy: Support youth empowerment initiatives.

Every North Carolina resident, whether parent, educator, policymaker, or community member, has a role in identifying systemic disparities and pushing for reform. By staying informed, supporting youth voices, and advocating for policy change, we help ensure schools are places of learning, not launching pads for justice system involvement.

Greetings,

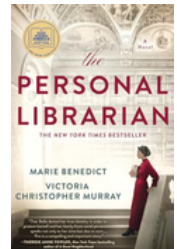

Greetings all!

In the June subscription of Response magazine, we find much to celebrate. This month, we reflect on an incredible milestone of 125 years of mission study and the faithful women whose dedication has shaped generations of ministry, service, and spiritual growth. As I read Celebrating 125 Years of Mission Study, I could not help but see how deeply this history reflects the mission of United Women in Faith which is to: connect and nurture women through Christian spiritual formation, leadership development, creative fellowship, and education so that they can inspire, influence, and impact local and global communities.

This knowledge equipped them to move beyond awareness into meaningful service. Through this learning came leadership development. For generations, women stepped into leadership roles in churches, communities, and mission fields. They became teachers, organizers, advocates, and servants, all examples of women who inspired others to act boldly in faith. Mission studies gave women confidence, knowledge, and a voice.

Along the way, creative fellowship flourished. Whether through Mission u, local unit meetings, summer gatherings, storytelling, skits, discussion, or shared worship, women found community in learning together. They encouraged one another, prayed together, and built lasting bonds of sisterhood. When we look back over these 125 years, we see the mission statement of United Women in Faith woven into every chapter. Women were connected, nurtured, formed spiritually, leaders, found fellowship, and received education, and because of all of this, they were able to inspire, influence, and impact local and global communities.

The article reminds us that a mission is not just about going somewhere, it is about becoming someone. It is about allowing God to transform our hearts so we can better serve others. The work of United Women in Faith continues because we are women of faith, action, and sisterhood. We are connected by God's love and called to serve with courage. We are part of an unstoppable mission, one that has endured for generations and continues through each of us. As we celebrate 125 years of mission study, may we honor the women who came before us by continuing their work. May we keep learning, keep growing, keep leading, and keep serving. Because when women of faith come together in love and action, God does amazing things and through His grace, our sisterhood remains strong, our faith remains rooted, and our mission remains unstoppable.

From Sparta/Elkin areas: Take I-77 South to Exit 65 and keep right to NC-901 North. In 2.1 miles, turn left onto Sloan Mills Road. The church will be on the right.

From Statesville, Hickory, Granite Falls areas: Take I-40 West to I-77 North. In 14 miles, take Exit 65 and keep left to NC-901 North. In 2.3 miles, turn left onto Sloans Mill Road. The church will be on the right.

From Taylorsville/Stony Point/Hiddenite: Take NC-115 North (toward Wilkesboro); turn right onto NC-901 South. In 5.2 miles, turn right onto Sloans Mill Road. The church is on the right. Or take I-40 & follow directions from Statesville.

From Boone & Wilkesboro areas: Take US-421 South to Exit 282 (NC-115 South); keep right toward Statesville. In 12 miles, turn left onto NC-901 South. In 5.2 miles, turn right onto Sloans Mill Road. The church will be on the right.

From Lenoir/Hudson: Take NC-18 to Moravian Falls NC. Turn left on NC-16 North (toward Wilkesboro) and at the 1st traffic light (Country Club Road), turn right. 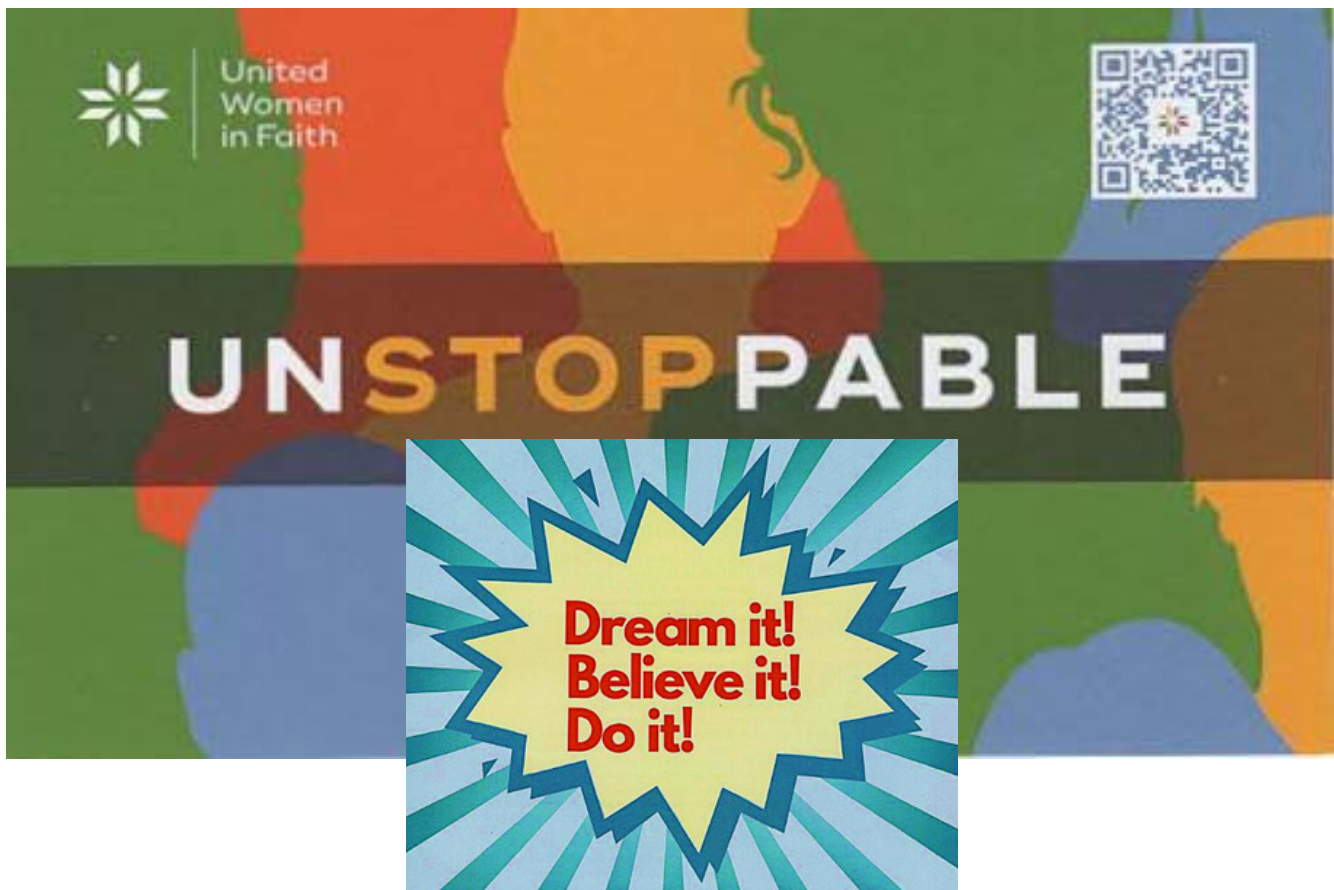
